MINUTES FOR MONTGOMERY TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE MEETING February 2, 2023 5:30 p.m.

1. Montgomery Township Committee met at 5:30 pm on the above date at the Municipal Complex, 100 Community Drive, Skillman, NJ. Those present were:

2. Mayor Keenan stated the following: "Under the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Act, notice of the time and place of this meeting has been posted and sent to the officially designated newspapers."

3. RESOLUTION TO CLOSE MEETING TO THE PUBLIC

BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Montgomery in Somerset County, New Jersey as follows:

- 1. The Township Committee will now convene in a closed session that will be limited only to consideration of items with respect to which the public may be excluded pursuant to Section 7B of the Open Public Meetings Act.
- 2. The general nature of the subject to be discussed in this session is as follows:

- 5. Mayor Keenan led the salute to the flag.

6. PROCLAMATION - BLACK HISTORY MONTH

WHEREAS, during Black History Month, we celebrate the many achievements and contributions made by African Americans to our economic, cultural, spiritual and political development; and

WHEREAS, in February 1926, Dr. Carter Godwin Woodson, noted Black scholar and son of former slaves, initiated Black History Week; and

WHEREAS, for many years the second week of February, chosen so as to coincide with the birthdays of Frederick Douglas and Abraham Lincoln, was celebrated by African Americans in the United States; and

WHEREAS, in 1976, as part of the nation's bicentennial, Black History Week was expanded and became established as Black History Month, and is now celebrated all over North America; and

WHEREAS, the observance of Black History Month calls our Nation's attention to the continued need to battle racism and to build a society that lives up to its democratic ideals; and

WHEREAS, the Stoutsburg Sourland African American Museum, located in Skillman is a place that instills the history of the unique culture, experiences, and contributions of the African American community of the Sourland Mountain region dating back to colonial times; and

WHEREAS, the Museum's purpose is to create awareness and educate the public about the African American residents who lived in this unique community and rose up from slavery to be men and women whose labor helped create one of the wealthiest areas in New Jersey.

NOW, THEREFORE, we the Montgomery Township Committee do hereby proclaim February 2023 as Black History Month in Montgomery Township and urge all citizens to celebrate our diverse heritage and culture.

7. FOURTH QUARTER FINANCIAL REPORT AND REVENUE DISCUSSION

Chief Financial Officer Michael Pitts gave a presentation on the 4th Quarter finances for 2022. Items discussed were:

- Revenues
- Fees and Permits
- Tax Sale
- Supplemental School Tax Bills
- Contract Negotiations
- Budget Preparations
- 2023 Budget Schedule
- 1st Quarter 2023 Preview
- 7-1. Committee Member Barragan asked for a preview of how premium bills for the Township will look like in the future. Mr. Pitts responded stating that municipalities that are part of the State Health Benefit Plan should see a premium increases between 22% and 25%. There are union negotiations at the moment. Montgomery will not be affected since they are not part of the State Health Benefit Plan.

7. PUBLIC COMMENT

- 7-1. Jeffrey Grant, 6 Livingston Drive, asked about Ordinance 23-1693 and added that he felt the Mayor should not be the appropriate authority on this matter. He inquired as to who owns the municipal building and commented that the acoustics in the building could work better.
- 7-2. Thomas Lee, Millstone River Road, raised concerns about the bypass around Hillsborough by River Road and stated he was concerned about the cars racing on River Road, the maintenance of the road by Somerset County, and the 18-wheeler double decker tour buses going down the road.
- 7-3. Sadaf Jaffer, Harvard Circle, gave praise and congratulations to the Mayor for listening to the public and dealing with the recent difficulties this past year.
- 7-4. Gloria Marconi, 3502 Symes Drive, inquired if a 55 and older affordable housing community will be built. She followed up with a second concern in regard to how safe the old municipal complex is for people walking by. Finally, she asked if they could install a right turn only sign by the bypass going towards New Brunswick.
- 7-5. Jessie Havens, 33 Ludlow Ave, asked about updates and progress of work being done on the Rock Brook Bridge.
- 7-6. Brian Hamilton, 15 East Hartwood Drive, had a few questions in regards to municipal codes and how restrictive they could be for backyard, fencing and patio work.
- 7-7. Shailesh Swaroop, 297 Sunset Road, commented on how more charging stations for electric cars would be beneficial for the town.
- 7-8. Attorney Rubinstein Quiroga stated that Ordinance 23-1693 was printed without the referenced underlining. There will be a public hearing on the ordinance later in the meeting.
- 7-9. Mr. Pitts responded that Somerset County owns the land and this building. Currently Montgomery is paying a bond debt to the County until 2050. Mayor Keenan added that acoustics design was made back in 2015 and they are working on improving the sound quality of the room.
- 7-10. Administrator Savron acknowledged the problem of racing cars and buses in the area and will be having more discussions with Police Captain Bet to address the issue. She added that in regards to the maintenance on the roads, they can reach out to Somerset County to find out better solutions as well as follow up with Shade Tree Committee.
- 7-11. Administrator Savron stated that there will be a presentation scheduled in regards to the upcoming affordable senior housing that is being built. It will take potentially 6 months to a year to break ground and the waitlist normally stands at 18 months. If anyone is interested, they should add their name to the list as soon as possible.
- 7-12. Mayor Keenan answered the few questions in regards to the old Municipal building. There are plans to remove the building entirely. The police have been patrolling the area from a safety perspective.
- 7-13. Administrator Savron responded that the bypass near Hillsborough would be a question for the State. She mentioned that the Township Engineer works with a Traffic Advisory Committee who then make formal requests to the State and County agencies. Every agency has a different process on how the requests are made.
- 7-14. Administrator Savron mentioned that last week Landmarks Commission met and discussed the Rock Brook Bridge. There was a recent update at the last Township Committee meeting and currently they are waiting on approval from Somerset County for the next steps.
- 7-15. Administrator Savron stated that the building codes in regards to the patios and backyards changed a few years ago around the time of the pandemic. Developers came to the Township and asked for some changes due to some oversized lots.
- 7-16. Mayor Keenan responded that they are currently working on adding more electric charging stations as more new retail and development spaces are being built.
- 7-17. There being no further comment, Mayor Keenan closed public comment.

WHEREAS, the Bylaws indicate that MidJIF shall pay each Risk Management Consultant a fee to be established annually by the Executive Committee.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Township of Montgomery does hereby reappoint Acrisure as its Risk Management Consultant in accordance with the Fund's Bylaws.

D. RESOLUTION #23-2-58 - AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF A SHARED SERVICES AGREEMENT PURSUANT TO N.J.S.A. 40A:65-1, et seq., WITH PRINCETON FOR PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES

F. RESOLUTION #23-2-60 - PROVIDING FOR THE DEFERRAL OF LOCAL DISTRICT SCHOOL TAXES OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MONTGOMERY

WHEREAS, The Township Committee of the Township of Montgomery, County of Somerset, under the provisions of statutes, wishes to defer Local District School Taxes; and

WHEREAS, The unpaid portion of the Local District School Tax on December 31, 2022 may be deferred to the extent of not more than 50% of the school year July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023 levy, providing no requisition has been made for such amount or any portion of such amount; and

10. RESOLUTION #23-2-64 - REQUESTING A TRAFFIC STUDY AND COMPLETION OF SIDEWALKS AT THE INTERSECTION OF ROUTES 518 AND 601 IN MONTGOMERY TOWNSHIP

WHEREAS, the concerned residents in the Blawenburg section of Montgomery Township submitted a petition to the Governing Body seeking to improve safety through Blawenburg and at the intersection of Routes 518 and 601; and

WHEREAS, said residents have presented sound and convincing reasons for the County to conduct a traffic study of the intersection of County Routes 518 and 601; and

WHEREAS, the dangers posed to pedestrians, cyclists, motorists, residents and visitors to this historic area include an excessive 40-mile per hour speed limit, right turn on red from southbound 601 onto westbound 518, lack of signage warning of the presence of children, lack of a crosswalk across the southern approach to the intersection, lack of sidewalks in certain areas, vibration damage to historic buildings, and noise pollution linked to the use of Jake brakes by dump trucks; and

WHEREAS, there have been twenty reported motor vehicle accidents within the intersection from July 2012 to December 2022.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Montgomery Township Committee hereby requests that the Somerset County Engineering Division, Department of Public Works complete the sidewalks at the intersection and undertake a traffic study to encompass the intersection of County Routes 518 and 601 in the Blawenburg section of Montgomery Township.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Township Clerk shall communicate said request for the Traffic Study to Matthew Loper, PE, County Engineer, Somerset County Department of Public Works.

WHEREAS, the contract will not exceed \$777,998.76 for the extended year effective March 1, 2023 through February 29, 2024. This is an increase of 5%, which is presently below the Consumer Price Index rate of 11.7% in motor vehicle maintenance and repair to the target and non-target rates for this extension period. There is no increase of a cost adjustment for changes in contractual fleet size from 439 contract units to 445 contract units; and

WHEREAS, there exists account numbers 07-201-55-544-256 and 01-201-26-315-230 which will fund this service; and

WHEREAS, a certificate as to the availability of funds has been signed by the Chief Financial Officer and is on file in the office of the Township Clerk.

- 3. It is unknown precisely when the matter discussed in this session will be disclosed to the public. Acquisition of property and settlement of agreements shall only be approved by the Township Committee in a public session.
- 18-1. Deputy Mayor Singh moved to close the meeting to the public. The motion was seconded by Committee Member Barragan and carried unanimously.
- 18-2. Deputy Mayor Singh moved to reopen the meeting to the public. The motion was seconded by Committee Member Barragan and carried unanimously.
